

A Message from Fr. Jake....

This weekend's Gospel passage from the 11th chapter of John describes how Jesus raised his friend, Lazarus, from the dead. I have meditated for hours upon this passage throughout my life because of how Jesus reacts to this particular situation involving his close friend, and I believe that his actions can help us to better understand how Christ wants to help us in our lives.

This passage reveals just how much Jesus cares for us. We hear in this Gospel reading that the Jews were going to try to kill Him if He went back to the area where Martha, Mary, and Lazarus lived, but he knew that He must take the risk in order to help His friend. As with the entirety of the Gospel of John, we also hear how this event is going to be a "sign" which will point to the glory of the Kingdom of God. Jesus will not stay away from us because He wants to give us gifts of the Kingdom of God. Therefore, Jesus provides grace upon grace, mercy upon mercy, to us no matter where we are at in our lives. Even our personal sinfulness will not keep away our Lord who desires to be our friend. When I feel as if I'm becoming estranged from Christ, I remember what He did for Lazarus, and this gives me hope that Christ will meet me in my deepest need.

After Jesus made the trip, we hear about Jesus' emotional response to the situation. Jesus wept for his friend and his family, but he also consoled those who were living. In the funeral rite of the Catholic Church, this event is recalled at burials because of how profound Jesus' love exists for each of us: "Lord, you consoled Martha and Mary in their distress; draw near to us who mourn and dry the tears of those who weep." Jesus is constantly moved by our needs. He is not distant. Jesus wants to provide us consolation in the midst of our grief and sorrow, especially by his words from Sacred Scripture. It is definitely difficult for us to receive these words of comfort in the midst of our grief and sorrow, but we need to remember he is there. The latter is the reason that the funeral Mass provides so much comfort because Jesus is truly present through the Eucharist we celebrate.

Martha and Mary assumed that Jesus was too late. Their disappointment is something that we can relate to in our own lives because we all have had unmet expectations. We all have experienced unanswered prayers. However, what Jesus did for their brother was something that they could not even have imagined, so the same is true in our lives. If we remain faithful to God, we will come to experience his love and mercy in ways that we cannot imagine because of the limitations that come from being human. As my spiritual director once told me, "Jake, it is good that God is bigger than our prayers because we simply do not fully understand how the Kingdom of God is at work in the world."

Finally, the image of rolling away the stone is one that has captured the minds of many different spiritual writers over the history of the Church. For me, this action of rolling away the stone means that we have to do some things in our life that we do not fully understand, and we also have to do some things that are difficult. Even though we do not understand or we face difficulties, we are confident that our faithfulness will be rewarded by Jesus Christ. As the Mother of Jesus said earlier in the Gospel of John to the servers at the wedding feast of Cana ("do whatever he tells you to do"), we simply need to respond to Jesus' invitation to discipleship.

Our Lady of Victory, please pray that we may come to love better through our meditation on the life of your son, Jesus Christ.

Blessing Bags

Luke 6:35-38 states, "But love your enemies, do good to them, and lend to them without expecting to get anything back. Then your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, because He is kind to the ungrateful and wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." The final weeks of Lent are upon us and as we give, we will be rewarded as Luke states, especially if we do not judge while giving.

The last items on our list of needs for the *Blessing Bags* are: mints, gum, beef jerky, granola or breakfast bars, crackers with cheese or peanut butter, trail mix or nuts, any non- perishable snack items. Christian Service Ministry will fill the bags and after Easter, will hand out the filled bags-our *Blessing Bags*-to you to put in your car to give to those in need when you see them. The filled backpacks will be delivered to the homeless shelters in downtown Davenport. What a

A seizure is a short change in normal brain activity that can cause changes in awareness, behavior, or body movement. Seizures are the main sign of epilepsy, a brain disorder that causes repeated seizures. Seizures can also be caused by other medical problems such as high fever, low blood sugar, or drug or alcohol withdrawal. About 1 out of 10 people may have a seizure during their lifetime, which means seizures are common. It's important to recognize when a seizure is happening and know how to help. Most seizures are not like on TV where the person falls to the ground, shaking and becoming unaware about what's going on around them. That is one kind of a seizure but, the most common type is where the person may seem confused, stare into space, wander, make unusual movements, or be unable to answer questions or talk. Some people with seizures feel sensations such as a strange taste or smell or a "funny feeling" in their stomach. Not all seizures are emergencies, and most will stop on their own within a few minutes. The first response is to remain calm and provide care and comfort. Time the seizure, and check for a medical identification bracelet or other emergency information. Stay with the person until the seizure ends or is fully awake. After it ends, explain to them what happened. Most seizures do not require emergency medical attention. Only call 911 if one or more of the following are true:

1)The person has never had a seizure before.

2) The person has difficulty breathing or waking after the seizure.

3) The seizure lasts longer than 5 minutes

4) The person has another seizure soon after the first one

5) The person is hurt during the seizure

6) The seizure happens in water

7) The person has a health condition like diabetes, heart

disease, or is pregnant.

If the person is having a generalized tonic-clonic seizure also called a grand mal seizure here are additional things you can do for them. Ease the person to the floor, turn the person gently onto one side, this will help the person breathe. Clear the area around the person of anything hard or sharp to prevent injury. Put something flat and soft, like a folded jacket under his or her head. Remove eyeglasses, loosen ties or anything around the neck that may make it hard to breathe. Time the seizure and call 911 if it lasts longer than 5 minutes.
