Guardian Angel Pre-School

From the moment of birth, children begin to learn about the world. These early learning experiences affect their future cognitive, social, physical and emotional development. Although children are actively learning whenever they are at home, attending story hour at the library, or participating in kid-centered community events, a structured preschool learning opportunity can be beneficial for any young child.

JFK, through Guardian Angel Preschool, has offered preschool since 1985. Guided by the Iowa Early Learning Standards, the curriculum of preschool has evolved from periods of socialization, stories, and snacking into an organized curriculum of math, literacy, and emotional and social skills through teacher-lead group instruction and learning center activities with peers. JFK has preschool classes for three year olds and four year olds.

JFK's four-year-old preschool classes meet for approximately three hours five days a week in the morning or the afternoon. Capped at 20 students with a ten-to-one or less student-to-adult ratio, group instruction emphasizes emerging literacy and math skills. Large motor skill activities take place in a fenced, outdoor play area, weather permitting. Children must turn four years of age on or by September 15th of the year they begin the 4-year-old program at Guardian Angel. While most of the 4 year old program is FREE, JFK's preschool program is longer than required by the lowa Department of Education, so there is an extended time fee paid at the time of registration. 5 year old students can register for a second year of preschool, and a tuition rate will apply to these students.

Three-year-olds have two options for preschool at JFK: Monday-Wednesday-Friday or Tuesday-Thursday, mornings only, between the hours of 7:25-9:55am. While in attendance, these youngest students become acclimated to preschool activities with an emphasis on socialization, problem-solving, and following directions. Table activities introduce students to holding pencils and using scissors, for example, and students use the outdoor play area as well. Children must turn three by their first day of attendance or by September 15th of the year they begin 3-year-old preschool, and they must be able to use the bathroom independently. There is a tuition charge for preschool.

Families needing childcare can take advantage of the Early Childhood Learning Center's (ECLC) option of wrap-around care. Childcare begins at 7:00 am and ends at 5:30 pm. Four year olds attend morning preschool classes and are escorted back and forth from preschool rooms to the childcare room. Three year olds who need childcare remain in the center and attend preschool five days a week. A hot lunch is provided, and a period of napping is scheduled for all the 3 year olds, with an option for 4-year-olds to nap as well. The staffing of the center follows a 1:8 ratio of staff to students for three year old children, and a 1:12 ratio for the four-year-olds. Childcare rates are paid either weekly or monthly. The ECLC and its staff are licensed by the lowa Department of Human Services.

Three, four, and five year old preschool and daycare registration has begun. Spots can go fast, so don't delay registration. For more information, call the JFK school office at 563-391-3030.

The Lost is Found!

When the parish was established in 1962, Masses were held at Assumption High School. Construction of the school was completed in April 1964 and the first Mass was held in the school cafeteria on Easter Sunday of that year. There was a tabernacle, altar, crucifix and statues of Mary and Joseph.

The original crucifix that was used has remained at the school in the cafeteria. The Altar is now in the day chapel at the church and the tabernacle is used for adoration on Holy Thursday and the Christian Experience Weekends. For years Mary and Joseph were stored at the school in the old music and costume room.

Thom Gleich, a parish member and local wood carver, approached me and asked if he could repair Mary as he recalled that her fingers were broken off. However, when he went to retrieve the statue, it was discovered that she as well as Joseph were lost. Through the efforts of Chad Steimle, Evan Brankin, and myself Joseph was found in the pastor's office and Mary was located in the youth room in the rectory basement.

Mary needed extensive repairs as both of her hands and fingers were broken off and there were many cracks throughout her structure. Thom spent 40+ hours carving and meticulously repairing the statue. Joseph on the other hand only required a good cleaning.

By Easter of this year, 52 years later, they will be back together again! Mary and Joseph will be on display in the Gathering Space with the help of another parish member who volunteered to make stands for the statues to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of our Parish.

JFK Registration for 2022-23

Registration for all grades, 3 year old preschool through 8th grade, is underway for the 2022-23 school year at JFK. Contact the school office for more information (563-391-3030). What do people like about JFK? "I like the fact the school feels like one big family."

"I like how my children have learned to be respectful at school and have one on one attention when needed." "Structure, cúrriculum, discipline."

Tuition assistance is typically received by 75%-85% of families who apply. A family's "financial need" is determined through a formula that considers the family's total Catholic school education bill, family size, gross and net incomes, and other factors. Many of you know by now that this will be my last year at Our Lady of Victory. As I prepare for my departure and put things in order for my replacement, I find myself reflecting on many things. Recently I was invited to share a list of things that the youth ministry has done in the past ten years as part of our preparations for the 60th anniversary celebration at Our Lady of Victory. While I won't go into that whole list here, I'd like to offer some reflections and remind the parish family of what opportunities are still coming up for our young people.

What can I say about NCYC? We've seen trips to the largest Catholic youth conference in the country come and go, and each one has brought its own incredible experience and challenges. I expect almost everyone in our parish has heard about NCYC from friends, family, the Victory Voice, or just mass announcements if nothing else, but did you know that we have also started attending the deeply impactful Steubenville summer conferences? These are laser focused on giving teens a life-changing encounter with Jesus and we have seen real fruit of discipleship grow from them. You can still sign up to attend this summer's retreat for the weekend of July 15-17. We also started bringing our entire 7th grade class to Holy Fire Chicago for a conference retreat designed solely for middle school youth as part of their Confirmation preparation.

Of course, one can't mention NCYC and youth ministry without also bringing up our many fundraisers. If you participated in any or all of those, you have our great thanks for making NCYC possible! Most of all I find myself reflecting on the Sweetheart Dinner, the fundraiser everyone talks about. It was extremely intimidating to my rookie youth minister self! In many ways the Sweetheart Dinner is the face of youth ministry to the parish - because parishioners see so many of our youth's faces at the event! Over the years, the Sweetheart Dinner has grown; grossing more than \$3,000. Even more importantly the dinner has become an important way that our youth develop leadership skills. Youth have taken over for our adult head servers, serve as the MCs and help plan the decor. As the Sweetheart Dinners adapted for the pandemic, youth not only served in all those leadership capacities, but planned much of the to-go experience and made the desserts. Truly the face of youth ministry in our parish!

Of course, it isn't all trips and fundraisers. We have a lot of fun in youth ministry with weekly and monthly youth nights and fun events. Games are an important part of youth ministry as fun breaks down barriers and helps youth relax and open up with each other. So challenge your teen to some chubby bunny or pterodactyl for your next family weekend or sharing night, but don't let them talk you into watching every Marvel Movie in a marathon - we did two for youth ministry in preparation for Avengers: Infinity War and End Game, and those movies are only getting longer! Even when having fun, we were learning, praying, and serving. From our poignant prayer services and prayer tree initiative to many question and answer apologetics sessions on hot topics of all kinds for today's youth. The culture of service is still very much alive at OLV, and youth ministry is no exception. We've constantly sought out ways to support the poor men of the Catholic worker house: with meals, help cleaning, an entire service mission dedicated to improving their home situation, and a massive food drive during the pandemic. In addition to that we partnered with Rebuilding Together and Habitat for Humanity to coordinate other summer mission projects with the parish, and conducted dozens of smaller service events such as care packages for the homeless and handmade cards for first responders.

I can't reflect on the past few years at OLV without bringing up the pandemic. This has been a time of tremendous innovation for youth ministry with seeds planted that will hopefully bring great fruit. During the pandemic, we launched a new YouTube ministry making videos for teens and care package ministry whereby every high school youth in the parish received a gift from the parish every semester. For middle school students we launched Alpha online and then in person, as well as a cooking club started by 6th grade to continue feeding the needy. We're currently preparing for our next Alpha session which is open to 7th and 8th graders, and 6th graders can still sign up for the cooking club! With your support, all this and more can continue on into the future as youth ministry at Our Lady of Victory continues to innovate and minister to, for, and with the youth of the parish.





The sacraments of Christian initiation - Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist - lay the foundations of every Christian life. Each is meant to strengthen our faith and forge a deeper relationship with God. Baptism frees us from original sin, confirmation strengthens our faith and Eucharist allows us to taste the body and blood of eternal life and be reminded of Christ's love and sacrifice.

Baptism serves as the first sacrament one receives when entering the Catholic Faith. It is a sacrament of initiation (which you can only receive one time), meaning once you receive it, you officially enter into the body of Christ, the Catholic Church. The recipient receives justifying and sanctifying grace when baptized, and the Holy Spirit begins to dwell within them.

Confirmation follows Baptism as part of the initiation process with God and the Church, where the candidate receives the gift of the Holy Spirit and continues their journey with Christ. During Confirmation, the candidate is anointed on the forehead with chrism by a bishop. Since baptism typically happens when the candidate is a baby, confirmation is a great way for an older child to acknowledge that they still want to continue their journey with God and grow their relationship with Him.

Eucharist means thanksgiving. This is when Christ's body and blood are offered and then received by the parishioner in the form of bread and wine. Christ during the Last Supper broke bread, ate it, gave it to his disciples and told them to eat it. Now the priest, through the words of consecration, blesses and administers the Holy Communion during every mass to remind followers that they are one with Christ. Food and drink nourishes our bodies — Christ's blood and body nourishes us spiritually.

Our current practices have children receiving the Sacrament of Baptism as infants. In second grade children experience their First Communion. The Sacrament of Confirmation happens in 8th grade.

Children who were not baptized as infants or who were baptized but did not receive formal catechesis and have now reached the age of reason (age 7+) follow an adaptation of the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. This means that these children complete the sacraments of initiation at one time. For those not baptized they receive all three sacraments; if already baptized then these children receive Confirmation and First Eucharist together.

As families consider the passing on of faith to their children, keep in mind that children who have not been baptized by the age of reason (7+) will be asked to participate in the adapted Rite of Christian Initiation as preparation for the reception of the Sacraments of Initiation. Parents wanting their child to be baptized are asked to contact the Parish Office regarding registering for a Baptism Class. If you have a child who has reached the age of reason and not yet been baptized or did not receive the sacrament of First Eucharist in second grade please contact Kaye Meyers (davolvcre@diodav.org) about your child preparing to receive their sacraments.

Kitty Temming - 60 Years with Catholic Schools -Chad Steimle

Chad Steimle, principal of JFK, reflects on his time with Mrs. Temming:
I first learned of Kitty's contribution to Catholic school education in our area when she was the principal at Lourdes in Bettendorf in the early 1990s, and I was teaching at Assumption. Some of our beginning-of-the-year in-services used to be held in Lourdes gym. Everything, of course, was meticulously well-organized by Kitty's team and led to a great kick-off for the school year.

In 1997, Kitty began teaching at JFK, after having stepped down from Lourdes to focus more on her daughters for a few years. In the 2000-01 school year, Kitty served as both teacher and interim principal of JFK when the principal of the time experienced several health challenges. When I arrived in 2001, I was a bit intimidated by her. I was a "rookie" principal, and she was an experienced principal and had experience at JFK too. Kitty became a trusted "teacher voice" for me. She didn't always tell me what I wanted to hear, but she, thankfully, told me what I needed to hear in a way that wasn't demoralizing but rather motivating and led to a better school.

In July 2014, JFK added the position of assistant principal/director of special programs, and I approached Kitty because you should always surround yourself with people better than you. For the past eight years, Kitty has been a force to manage the increasingly complex world of education. From preschool to Title services for students and from standardized testing to instructional services provided by aides, everything in education seems to be getting more and more complex.

Working with Kitty over the years has made so many of us better educators. She has always been someone with whom one can confide and trust to look out for the best interests of students and staff. Mentor to so many over the years in Catholic school education and for the last 25 years at JFK, in particular, we are so grateful to Kitty for her service. We wish her well in retirement.
