

A note from Father Jake

Happy 60th Anniversary, OLV! We give thanks to God for all of the blessings that our community has received over the last 60 years of serving Northwest Davenport. My six years as Pastor has shown me how God is truly working through the parishioners and the many ministries we provide. Thank you for all you do for the parish and school!

We began a new fiscal year in July, so in this issue we also provide a summary of the parish's sacramental ministry, census, and financials for July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. These numbers provide a small snapshot of what has happened in our parish over the last fiscal year.

The staff and volunteers of OLV had a busy year preparing families and individual parishioners for Baptisms, First Communions, and Confirmations. There were 125 individuals who received one or several of these Sacraments over

the last year, and our parish had many joyful celebrations around the Sacraments of Initiation. I want to personally thank all of the teachers, catechists, and volunteers that worked so hard to prepare children and adults for the reception of these Sacraments. Our parish is blessed by these amazing men and women who devote their time to serve in this important ministry of Sacramental preparation.

Our parish also had the privilege of celebrating with sixteen couples who celebrated their Sacrament of Matrimony here at OLV. The future of the church is bright with these couples' commitment to serving God and neighbor through their marriage.

In terms of total numbers of parishioners, we registered 60 new households over the last year. This influx of new parishioners has been a blessing as we also held 49 funerals during the year. To provide some context, our parish hosted less funerals over the last year than in the last three years. People are not celebrating funerals here at the parish at the same rate as they did prior to the pandemic. All realities mean that we are a parish composed of the young and not-so-young, and the number of parishioners who make-up our parish will always be in flux. If you know of any families who have not registered yet with the parish, please ask them if they want to join. I see new faces almost every week, and I do not always get the chance to greet them and inquire about whether they would like to register in our parish. The number of registered families definitely helps with planning the other activities in our parish.

I have one final note for this edition of the Victory Voice. Though we have celebrated our main 60th anniversary event, there are a few events remaining as we continue to celebrate our diamond anniversary. As I have shared above, we have a lot to celebrate, and these events give us the opportunity to thank God for the gifts that we have received. These events will also give us the opportunity to share our parish's vision of becoming the most welcoming and vibrant parish in the diocese. This vision flows from our parish's history, but this vision also reflects how individual parishioners desire to serve God and neighbor. If you have any ideas on how we as a parish can do more to address the needs of parishioners and others in our community, do not hesitate to let me know.

Please be assured of my continued prayers for all of you, and thank you for your continued prayers for our parish.



We build our community of faith through inspiring and prayerful worship, lifelong education for all, and loving service to one another and those in need.

We celebrate our faith with daily and weekend Masses, weddings, funerals, anointing of the sick, All Souls Day liturgy, and Masses in American Sign Language. Other experiences of prayer such as blessing for expectant parents, Holy Hour, stations of the cross and the rosary inspire the soul and bring us closer to the Lord.

Firmly committed to lifelong learning we offer various adult small group studies, while parishioners of every generation gather for IGNITE Sundays to pray, share a meal, and explore how to live out God's love in their personal and family lives. Our school, youth ministry and faith formation programs are beehives of activity where students examine Catholic beliefs and practices to become empowered for discipleship.

Although some expenses were slightly over budget a net gain of \$33,088 was realized thanks to the generosity of our donors and a refund from Annual Diocesan Appeal. Of this amount \$24,000 was added to parish savings.


Saturday, November 5 from 8:00am to 4:00pm and Sunday, November 6 from 9:00am to 1:00pm

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to listen and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to pray and protect our common home.

The Season "Celebration" begins on 1 September, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and ends on 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations.

This year we will unite around the theme, "Listen to the Voice of Creation."

The Psalmist declares, "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims God's handiwork. Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge...their voice is not heard; yet their voice goes out through all the Earth, and their words to the end of the world." (19: 1-4)

During the Season of Creation, our common prayer and action can help us listen for the voices of those who are silenced. In prayer we lament the individuals, communities, species, and ecosystems who are lost, and those whose livelihoods are threatened by habitat loss and climate change. It can be an outlet of expression, normalization of the hospital environment, and coping skills for procedures, tests, and other various treatments.
