One of the points I made was that the Liturgical Calendar, or Church Calendar as some would call it, is an annual cycle of seasons and feasts that teach us about Christ, and provides an "itinerary" that conforms us to Christ as we await His return.

At Pentecost our Easter celebration culminated with God filling us with the Holy Spirit, and re-uniting us in one Body of Christ as we enter Ordinary Time.


Ordinary Time, which lasts from now until Advent begins in late November, is a period to reflect on the teaching of Jesus in the Gospel, and how to live it in our daily lives. It is a time for ongoing conversion and for growing in relationship with Christ. This is anything but ordinary!

As July nears, I am reminded that I only got to spend one annual cycle with you at Our Lady of Victory. I originally expected to learn as a new priest for the first year, and then apply what I have learned and to grow in ministry in the next, or hopefully two years of ministry before I was assigned to another parish. I won't be able to apply my learnings here at OLV, but I will certainly take those lessons and fond memories with me to St. Joseph in DeWitt and Ss Philip and James in Grand Mound.

I am grateful for being able to spend this year with a vibrant, welcoming, active and faithful community of believers. It was through interacting with you, ministering to you, laughing and crying with you, that I learned how to be a priest. In seminary, we learn all the academic knowledge, we practice ministering the sacraments, and we prepare for the ministry of priesthood; but it is in our first assignment where we truly learn how to be a priest. I will pray for your health and well-being, your ongoing conversion, and for your collective ministries at Our Lady of Victory, and ask that you pray for me and for all priests.

LIVING STEWARDSHIP THROUGH THE LOVE OF MUSIC AND A

Inspired by her mom, Sharon Ehlers developed a love for music and song early in life. She recalls her mother going about the house singing along with the radio or record player and harmonizing with anyone willing to join in the merriment. This festive environment led Sharon to a keen interest in school chorus and band where she further developed musical expertise. As a teen flutist she was invited to accompany the OLV Adult Choir at a special feast day Mass. She promptly joined the choir and has been serving our congregation with the gift of music for more than 45 years.

Through the Choir Sharon met and later married husband, Monte, himself a talented instrumentalist and vocalist. Their daughter Christina, born into a family of music lovers, was exposed to melody and song from a young age, eventually joining her parents as a musical artist with this same vocal group.

Beginning in fall 2017 Sharon took over the choir director's baton and began creating a tapestry of sound to boost our parish worship experience. She developed a repertoire of music to enhance the weekly readings and mirror the homily while guiding tempo and dynamics during the 9:00 AM Sunday Mass and other special liturgies. She's lead weekly rehearsals, encouraged vocalists to improve their technique and sing with passion, while managing all aspects of recruiting new members. Over the years her greatest joy has been watching the 35+ members unify as a community and deepen their connection to the divine. She describes the choir as a



close-knit family providing a network of encouragement and care that extends well beyond the confines of our church walls. Sharon firmly believes that every director, throughout our 63-year parish history, has taken the choir to the next level. Hard work, communal bonding, and openness to learning has formed a group that she describes as "bigger, better, and stronger than ever before." She acknowledges that participation in the Adult Choir has been a deeply rewarding and enriching experience that honed her leadership skills and served as a platform for personal growth. Going forward Sharon hopes that the choir will continue to grow, and new singers will emerge to replace the seasoned voices no longer able to perform effectively due to age.

While no one looks forward to leaving a profoundly transformative experience, Sharon prayerfully decided that she would step away from director role after the 2024-25 season to have more time for leisure and travel. While we will miss her dedication and vibrant spirit, we give thanks and praise to God for the time and musical skill devoted to lifting the hearts of our congregation and inspiring us to walk more closely with the Lord. As she embarks on this new journey, Sharon stresses that she is merely "stepping back—not stepping away. When in town, I can still be found singing with Monte, Christina, and the rest of my choir family." With deep appreciation for Sharon's immeasurable contribution to music ministry at Our Lady of Victory parish, we say "farewell"—secure in the knowledge that this is not goodbye!

Their petals are various, rich colors, but at the center of each one are the seeds. Just as the seeds are in the middle of each sunflower, so should Jesus Christ be the center of our lives as Christians. As practicing Catholics, this is how we are called to live, turning to the Son, just as each beautiful sunflower turns to the sun!

We can find throughout Scripture that we need to put the Lord first in all things, but how can we apply this to our lives and support this within our domestic churches?

- Schedule some time to visit a sunflower field this summer and take in the abundant beauty. During your visit, or once you get home, take some time to discuss as a whole family what it means to live a Christ-centered life. What does that mean to you and your family members? Is there a need to grow and look more toward the sun, as the sunflowers do?
- You can expand upon the scripture listed in this article or dive into any of the Gospels. Listening to the song 'Jesus at the Center' would also be a nice way to foster prayer and engaging family conversations on this topic.
- For those with younger children or who enjoy arts or crafting, take some time to further illustrate our desire to have Christ at the center like our sunflower friends by using brown, yellow and/or orange construction paper. You can cut out sunflower petals and write down all the ways that your family does, or wants to, carry out a life that is centered on our Lord. Cut out a brown circle for the center and write JESUS in the middle of it. Use tape or a glue stick to bring it all together and hang it where it is not only a nice reminder to everyone in your family, but also as a way to evangelize all those you enter into your home!
- Let us pray: 'Lord, we come before you today to thank you for the beauty of the summer season and to fully commit ourselves to making You the center of our lives. We want to conform our will to Yours and surrender fully to You. Amen. Saint James, the greater, pray for us!' (Feast day July 25th)

GriefShare is a Christ-centered grief support group offered at OLV twice a year. Each session is now 11 weeks long and includes two video-based lessons spread over different weeks.

Our next GriefShare series begins Tuesday, September 2, and will meet weekly from 1:00–2:30 p.m. in the Gathering Space meeting room. The final session will be held on November 11, 2025.

The cost is \$20, which covers the workbook you'll receive on the first day. However, no one will be turned away due to cost. To register, please call the rectory at 563-391-4245 so we can order enough materials for everyone.

Each session includes a video followed by group discussion. You're never required to speak, but everyone is welcome to share if they feel comfortable. The program is led by two trained facilitators, and we begin and end each session with a simple prayer, such as the Our Father or Hail Mary.



This fall, we're refreshing our Nourish caregiver support group at OLV! Starting in September, we'll be meeting on a new day: the 3rd Wednesday of each month, from 1:00-2:30 PM, in the Gathering Space Meeting Room.

We're also excited to offer something new: while caregivers participate in the monthly discussion, your loved ones will be welcomed in the Gathering Space with two of our wonderful health advocates—Bonnie, a retired occupational therapist, and Julie, who worked in physical therapy. Each month, they'll lead a simple activity and offer a light snack for your loved ones.

We don't focus on specific diagnoses, but rather on shared experiences that apply to many caregiving situations whether you're supporting someone with dementia, mobility challenges, stroke recovery, or other health concerns. We invite both you and your loved one to take a short break and connect with others.
