Children deserve the best education possible during their early childhood and grade school experiences. At JFK and Guardian Angel Preschool, we provide for the development of the whole child – spiritually, socially, emotionally, physically, and intellectually – through a partnership with parents and a safe environment where learning is structured and nurtured each day.

John F. Kennedy Catholic School successfully provides the environment in which children can thrive in all areas of life. Our Leaps & Bounds summer program offers reading and math skills development for students of all ability levels, and other summer programming is available to students in various grade levels.

Over 33% of our students receive tuition assistance to JFK or Assumption High School, and our 4 year old preschool program receives state funding. Aspects of Religion that Fill Their Hearts

JFK's 8th graders participated in the Pope's synodal listening process. What "fills the hearts" of 8th graders regarding their faith are the following:

3. Opportunities to talk to one another about their faith
4. Time set aside for personal prayer and Reconciliation

HVAC SYSTEM

The largest piece of the Cultivating Our Future capital campaign was to add a high efficiency VRF heating/air conditioning system and mechanical ventilation for the 1963 and 1987 parts of the school building. With this work completed in the summer of 2021, JFK is the only Catholic school in Scott County with modern HVAC systems. While the driving force to replace the previous heating system was the condition of the hot water heating pipes, the students and staff enjoyed the new air conditioning the most.

PARKING LOT WORK

Finishing off the big projects for OLV's Cultivating Our Future capital campaign, concrete work was completed near the school entrance and in the parking lot. The parking lot was also sealed and re-striped. In anticipation of the parking lot work, the barriers and bollards near the school were adjusted to accommodate a better drop off/pick up traffic flow.

Formation of Scott County Catholic Schools Regional System Continues

The unification of JFK, the other three Catholic elementary schools in Scott County, and Assumption High School into one regional system continued. A legal corporation was formed, trustees and board members were appointed (of which Fr. Greiner is a member of both), a new parish subsidy model was created for all supporting parishes, and many financial and personnel related items were put into motion. The unified system is set to begin on July 1, 2023.

RESTRICTED FEDERAL FUNDS SUPPORT JFK

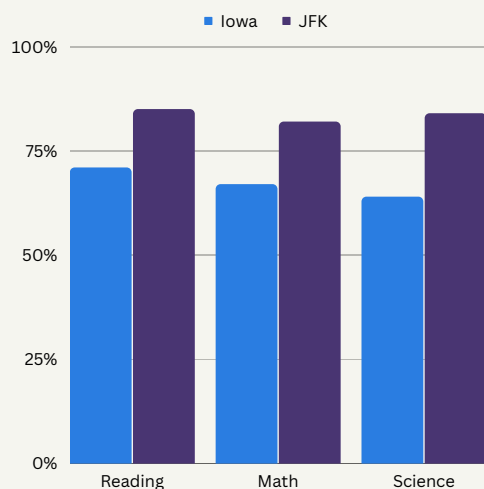
Since spring 2020 through June 2024, OLV/JFK has been on track to receive as much as \$1.3 million or more in federal funding or services through COVID relief programs, Educational Title programs, and the National School Lunch Program. Some of the benefits of these restricted funds include the following:

- Payroll was supported during the shutdowns in spring/summer 2020
- JFK became 1 to 1 with Chromebooks in grades 3-8 and iPads in K-2
- Reading interventionist services were increased for two years.
- School based professional therapist services were offered free to students for three years
- JFK's summer reading and math program, Leaps & Bounds, was offered to students at no charge for two summers
- School lunches were free for all families for two years
- Other purchases to support professional development, technology implementation, communications and operations, and building cleaning.

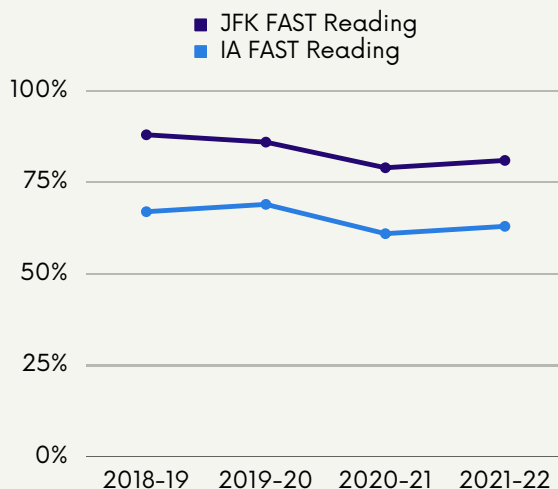
FAITH in Oneself

The fully certified staff members challenge students to achieve even beyond the students' own imaginations. Through research paper writing or public speaking, students even surprise themselves with their gifts and talents. "Civic Oration," a talented and gifted project in which ALL 5th-8th graders participate and which now also includes a slide presentation, is mentioned by nearly 70% of graduating students as the one activity at JFK of which they are the most proud.

JFK graduates are also often the top students at local high schools, and their standardized test scores are consistently well above state averages. The below graph shows the percent of JFK's and the state of Iowa's 3rd-8th graders students who were proficient on the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress in spring 2022.



Students in grades K-2 also take the Formative Assessment System for Teachers in reading. Again, the percent of JFK students at benchmark consistently exceeds the percent of students across the whole state of Iowa.

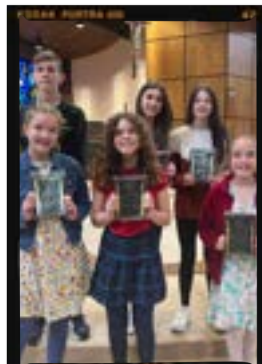

The Playbook details the quality, intentional teaching at JFK and the implementation and feedback data points that lead to JFK students' well-being and achievement. Unique in education, JFK's Instructional Playbook thoroughly documents the social-emotional learning and academic processes that make a difference in education.



High Reliability Schools Survey

Following the framework of Dr. Bob Marzano and 40 years of educational research, JFK began work toward certification as a High Reliability School. The first level of certification focuses on having a safe, supportive, and collaborative culture. According to survey results of parents, students, staff, and administrators, JFK's strengths in this level are the following:

- The school environment is safe and orderly
- The fiscal, operational, and technological resources of the school are managed in a way that directly supports teachers
- The teachers have formal roles in the decision-making process
- Teacher teams and collaborative groups regularly interact to address common issues regarding curriculum, assessment, instruction, and student achievement

Improvements could be made, according to the survey, in having formal input means regarding the optimal functioning of the school and in celebrating our collective and individual successes

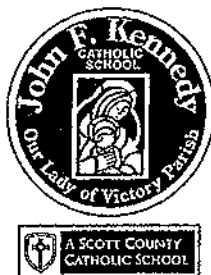

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Answers to Frequently Asked Questions, 2023-24

Q. What type of environment does John F. Kennedy Catholic School provide?

- A. Our Lady of Victory parish, through John F. Kennedy Catholic School, Guardian Angel Pre-School, and our daycare (Early Childhood Learning Center), provides a pre-school – 8th grade Christ-centered, nurturing, caring, safe environment. Acting as an extension of the family, the staff of JFK encourages all students to realize and reach their true potential. Students are taught life skills and values, including to respect others, care for and help others, and to be accountable for their actions.

Q. How important is religion as part of the school curriculum?

- A. Christ is at the center of the curriculum and activities at the school. Students spend nearly three and a half hours each week engaged in faith formation activities, including weekly Masses, daily religion classes, daily prayer, and service activities. On the first Friday of each month, students participate in Adoration. Service activities and retreat opportunities are age appropriate and allow students to put their faith into action. In addition to classroom teachers, religious instruction is enhanced by the pastor, coordinator of religious education, and coordinator of youth ministry.

Q. What are the curriculum standards, and what academic resources are made available to the students?

All students spend at least 90 minutes per day in reading/literature and language arts, even in the middle school years, and 60 minutes of math per day. JFK follows the curriculum guidelines of the Diocese of Davenport and the Iowa Core, which is based upon the national Common Core. JFK students, on the average, perform far better than other students on formal assessments. Students begin writing research papers as early as the fourth grade, and all 5th-8th grade students compete in a speech contest which requires both a research paper and a public speech. JFK graduates are regularly among the top students at Assumption, West, North, Central and even North Scott high schools. It is a common occurrence for a JFK alumnus to be the valedictorian of his/her graduating high school class. JFK students and graduates do exceptionally well in the areas of leadership, service, academics, music, and athletics. High school teachers often remark that they can easily identify JFK graduates in their classes.

Tutoring and extra help are available to those students who need extra support, and special enrichment activities are available for those students excelling. One of the unique characteristics of JFK is that many activities that might be just in a Talented and Gifted program in other buildings are either *required of or open to all students* at JFK. Lego League, for example, is active in multiple grades, and we have even had a JFK student who was the national winner in past speech contests.

Q. What are the hours of the school day and is there a before or after school program?

A. K-8 classes start at 7:25 a.m., and school is dismissed at 2:40 p.m. except for Wednesdays when dismissal is at 1:40 p.m. Staff supervision begins at 7:10 a.m. and concludes at 2:55 p.m. The after school extended day program is available from 2:40-5:30 p.m. except Wednesdays when it starts at 1:40. A before school care program begins at 7:00 a.m. for morning preschoolers. There are additional charges for the before and after school programs. Times are subject to change each school year.

Q. Can my child be bused to school?

A. Yes. Davenport public school system will provide free transportation for children attending JFK, provided they meet distance requirements, which have typically been 1½ miles from JFK for students in grades K-5 and 1½ to 2 miles for students in grades 6-8. Parents of students who live in school districts other than Davenport may apply for a reimbursement for transporting their own children. The bus company, Durham, can be reached at 386-1436 for more information. Bus transportation is subject to change.

A. Student-teacher ratio in K-8: 13 to 1
K-8 ratio of staff working with students: 11 to 1
Average class size in K-8: 18.3
Aides are in several classrooms

Guardian Angel pre-school with teacher and aide(s):

3 year old program: 24 maximum, max 8 to 1 ratio

4 year old programs: 20 maximum, max 10 to 1 ratio

Q. Do you offer sports programs?

A. Sports programs can begin with Dav Parks & Rec teams associated with JFK in preschool and Kindergarten and continue throughout 8th grade. Parks & Rec operates fall and spring soccer, flag football, basketball, and softball programs. The Catholic League offers inter-scholastic competition for 6th-8th graders in at least volleyball and basketball that is both school based and parish based. Many of our students participate in Rising Knights and Future Lady Knights programs in football, wrestling, basketball, volleyball, and golf. These programs

can be excellent feeder programs to Assumption High School. There are also plenty of local programs for cheerleading, dance, and tumbling.

Q. Are there fine arts and music programs at John F. Kennedy?

A. JFK's music and drama programs are central to the school's culture. Students have two music classes each week. All students participate in musical productions each year, and 7th and 8th graders can also elect to be in choir. All 4th graders learn to play the recorder. Students can choose to begin instrumental music in the 5th grade where 90% or more of the students play an instrument. JFK has three bands: 5th, 6th, and 7th/8th grade. All students also have art class twice per week.

Q. Does John F. Kennedy offer extracurricular activities or field trips?

A. Our school has a variety of extra-curricular activities, including music, band, theater, student council, Lego League, writing journal, science fair, civic oration, creative writing, and several levels of scouts. Our students also experience academically enriching field trips to places such as the Chicago museums and the Quad City Symphony.

Q. Do you have a gym and a physical education program?

A. Students take physical education twice per week. Physical education classes emphasize cognitive understanding and individual growth and skill development. Including recesses, K-5 students have at least 30 minutes of physical activity each day, and 6-8 students have at least 120 minutes per week. Our parish has several acres of land available for student use, and the students enjoy our extensive playground equipment, soccer fields, a softball/baseball field, and a gymnasium.

Q. What technology resources or computer training is available to the students?

A. JFK has a 1:1 student to computer/tablet ratio in all K-8 grades. Students regularly use computers for research, composition, practice, and presentations. Students are also taught correct keyboarding skills. The school has interactive whiteboards and LCD projectors in each classroom, and students and staff utilize Google Apps for Education. An online math program adjusts students' supplemental lessons to students' ability levels. A comprehensive website, a manual and automated phone/text/email system, and social media enhance communications at JFK.

Q. What is the cost to educate my child at John F. Kennedy Catholic School?

- A. The practice of good stewardship is encouraged by all families and includes intentional giving of time, talent, and treasure. Many families respond with sacrificial giving through church envelopes and support the mission of educating our children. Many parishioners give 5 - 10% of their family income to the Scott County Catholic parishes and their mission of Catholic schools. Families that have gone before us have paid for the school building, and our dedicated teachers view their work as a gift back to God.

The actual cost to educate a PS-8 child at JFK, although over \$6,000 per student is significantly less than needed in the Davenport public schools. The Catholic parishes invest nearly \$1,500 in the education of each K-8 child. Tuition, fees, fundraisers, and other sources combine for the rest of our revenue.

Tuition rates and fees are adjusted each year. A separate tuition and fee schedule is published annually.

Many families utilize a monthly payment plan. Payments can also be made annually or semi-annually.

Q. Are there scholarships, credits, or financial assistance?

- A. Yes! Tuition assistance is available for many families. It includes the following:

Family Tuition Plan: The Family Tuition Plan is designed to make it possible for every interested Catholic family to choose a K-12 Catholic school education regardless of financial barriers. The Plan is also available for members of other religious traditions. Parents sometimes forego a Catholic school education for their children after analyzing family budgets and fearing that tuition costs may eventually become difficult to manage. The goal of the Family Tuition Plan is to alleviate these fears by providing tuition assistance through funds donated toward the Mississippi Valley Student Tuition Organization. Over \$1.3 million is distributed to students in Scott County Catholic schools, and over 1/3 of our students receive assistance. All families are encouraged to apply.

Iowa Education Tax Credit: Families can receive a credit of up to \$500 on their Iowa income taxes. (Consult your tax advisor.)

Grants and hardship assistance: Additional

parish grants and assistance may be arranged by the family with the pastor.

Scholarships: Several scholarships are available to 7th and 8th graders and students attending Assumption High School.

With rapidly developing legislation in Iowa, other funding opportunities may be available!

Q. Can my child attend John F. Kennedy Catholic School if we are not parishioners or Catholics?

- A. Yes, students of any religion or parish, race, ethnic background, and gender are welcome. Students of religious traditions other than Catholicism are treated as part of the family and participate in many of the religious activities. Some of our most active families are non-parishioners.

Q. Are there pre-school, kindergarten, and daycare opportunities available?

- A. Kindergarten is full day, and classes follow the same schedule as students in grades 1-8.

JFK's preschool, Guardian Angel Preschool, offers an academically enriching, age appropriate introduction to school with certified teachers. Three classes are available for three year olds: MWF 7:25-9:55, TTh 7:25-9:55, or M-F 7:25-9:55.

Four and five year olds can meet M-F mornings from 7:25 – 10:25 (until 9:55 on Weds) or M-F afternoons from 11:40 – 2:40 (11:10-1:40 on Weds).

Partial day and full day wrap around childcare is available for all programs.

Tuition rates and fees are adjusted each year. A separate tuition and fee schedule is published annually.

Four year old preschool is free for the first 10 hours per week for 1A four year olds. Because the standard program is more than 10 hours per week, a slight additional annual charge is billed for those who want the standard program.

Our partial day and full day wrap around childcare services in our Early Childhood Learning Center (ECLC) are provided by a licensed teacher. When combined with the preschool classes, students can have supervised instruction and care from 7:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Q. Are there summer options?

A. Yes, JFK has several summer options available from which to choose:

Tutoring/Lessons: One to one tutoring and instrumental lessons are available from certified staff. The rate is \$22 per hour/\$11 per half hour. Flexible arrangements are made between the family and staff member.

JFK Leaps & Bounds: Staffed by certified teachers, this summer program offers several two week sessions for those who want to get ahead or get caught up on their reading and math skills. Students in grades K-6 can participate in one session, all sessions, or any combination of the sessions.

Other: Other summer programming may be available, such as a weeklong JumpStart kindergarten.

Q. Is there a uniform policy?

A. Yes, JFK has a uniform policy that describes what is and is not acceptable attire. In general, boys and girls can wear collared polo shirts in red, navy, and white colors, and dress pants in navy and khaki colors. Girls can also wear the plaid jumpers or skirts. The detailed policy is available under "Policies and Forms" on our website.

Q. What type of lunch program is there?

A. Students have the option of hot lunch that is cooked on site (about \$2.85 per standard meal) or bringing their own lunches. Families can also apply for free or reduced price rates. Hot lunch menus are published monthly and available under the "Calendars" section of our website.

Q. Are the teachers qualified?

A. Yes. The teachers meet Iowa state certification standards with at least BA or BS degrees in education and continue to take classes to better themselves. Many staff members are also members of Our Lady of Victory and currently have or have had their own children at JFK.

Q. Do the teachers regularly assign homework?

A. Yes. The general rule of thumb is about ten minutes of homework per grade level per night. On some nights, there is more homework, and, on other nights, there is less. Special projects also require work outside of school, and reading and math outside of school are always encouraged.

Q. What opportunities are there for parents to become involved?

A. The school is an integral part of the Our Lady of Victory parish. Specific school organizations include the Home and School Association, the Music Boosters, and the Board of Education. There are opportunities for coaching, leading scout groups, and assisting on field trips, during retreats, and with service activities.

JFK offers After School Care for our students in Kindergarten through 12 years old. After School Care is held in the school lunchroom located just inside the school's main doors. Students are supervised in childcare from dismissal – 5:30^{PM}

COSTS: Registration fee is \$25.00 per family
\$5.00 per hour

Registration forms are available at the school's summer registration day held toward the beginning of August.



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Bus Transportation

Free school bus transportation is available through the Davenport Community School District (DCSD), under the direction of state legislation and subject to changes by the district, typically to students who live a distance of over 1-1/2 miles for K-5 and over 2 miles for 6-8 grade students. Students who live closer to school may apply for bus transportation and, if the application is accepted, pay a rider-ship fee. If a student meets the distance requirements for free transportation but the DCSD cannot provide a route, the DCSD will pay parents a reimbursement rate for transporting their own child. Bus transportation may also be available if students would have to cross Kimberly (a state highway), if walking. Bus transportation may be available to and from a sitter's house rather than from the child's own home.

If you are interested in bus transportation, please contact Durham, the company the DCSD contracts with for school bus services. The number is 386-1436. Durham offices are located near Chucky Cheese off East Kimberly: 3640 Davenport Avenue.

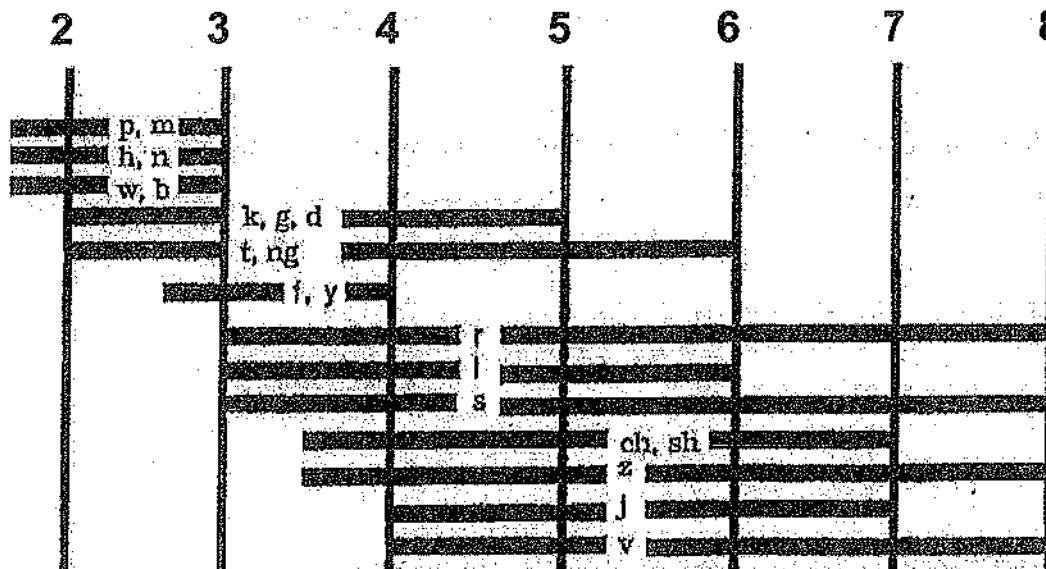
The bus route and schedule is subject to change each year and will be given to parents at the beginning of the school year.

...About Speech Sound Development

Many children see the Speech and Language Pathologist to work on sound production. Though children develop speech sounds at different rates, correct sounds are expected by specific ages. For example, children should be saying correct **L** sounds by the age of 6 and correct **R** sounds by the age of 8. Here are the guidelines followed by the Speech and Language Pathologist.

Suggestions to Encourage Speech Sound Development

1. Be a good speech model. When your child makes a sound error, repeat the word correctly in a short sentence. Avoid asking your child to imitate the correct word.
2.
 - a. **DO:** Child: "See the tat?"
Parent: "Yes, I see the cat."
 - b. **DON'T:** Child: "See the tat?"
Parent: "That's wrong, say cat."
3. Eliminate teasing or ridicule about your child's speech.
4. Avoid frequent corrections of your child's speech. Be more interested in what your child is saying, not how he's saying it.
5. If the Speech and Language Pathologist suggests direct help, set aside one time each day for practice.
6. Make talking fun. Encourage your child to talk by listening attentively and accepting his attempts to communicate.

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Health Concerns

At John F. Kennedy Catholic School, we have several people that can help with students' health concerns. Staff members in the office, before and after school child care, and several other areas are trained in CPR, basic first aid, and medication administration.

The Scott County Health Department also provides one nurse to oversee fourteen non-public schools in the Iowa Quad-Cities. Due to the number of schools in which she serves, her duties are typically more administrative. However, the health department nurse is a wonderful and knowledgeable resource for us.

At JFK, we can provide basic first aid and care for the daily assortment of "bumps" and "scrapes." We go through lots of band-aids! We can also administer medications such as antibiotics, Tylenol, inhalers, insulin, and nebulizer treatments, with the proper documentation on file in the office, and we have helped several students monitor diabetes. The staff is also trained in basic emergency care such as CPR and the administration of Epi-pens.

Injuries and concerns are typically documented and handled in the following manner:

- A. **Non Serious:** Superficial scrapes, bruises, minor cuts that do not require "stitches", short falls without striking the head, paper cuts, "hang nails", little Splinters, twisted extremities without swelling or deformity where the child has full use of the limb without pain etc. These are the type of injuries where the child is seen briefly, first aid administered and returned to their playground or classroom. Parent notification usually is not necessary.
- B. **Injuries of Concern, but not emergent:** These would be those injuries that are not emergencies at the present, but because of the nature of the mechanism of the injury or the possible complications, there is concern that the injury could develop into something more serious needing medical attention at a later time. Injuries from the neck up on a student's body are also considered to be of this type. These are the type of injuries where the parent is notified and makes the decision whether to take the child for medical attention now, after school or watch for complications into the evening and following days.
- C. **Emergencies:** These are the life threatening injuries where 911 is called, first aid is administered where appropriate, and parents are notified. These are emergencies such as asthma attacks, cardiac emergencies, head injuries with loss consciousness, obvious broken bones, eye injuries, etc.

Screenings are done during the school year for vision and hearing at various grade levels. In late spring, "growing up" talks are presented to boys and girls, separately, in fourth grade. Seventh graders have presentations regarding sexuality.

If you anticipate your child requiring medication during school hours, please note the medication policy and the permission forms that will be needed. Most medications, such as antibiotics, can be timed to be given at home. Others, such as inhalers, nebulizers, and epi-pens, should be kept at school in case of need. All medications are locked. No medication, including Tylenol or Neosporin, can be given without parent permission. Please note the medication policy, if you need. It is available on our website, www.olvjfk.com. Go to "policies and forms," and then to JFK parent/student handbook. The forms are in the handbook but listed separately under "policies and forms" as well.

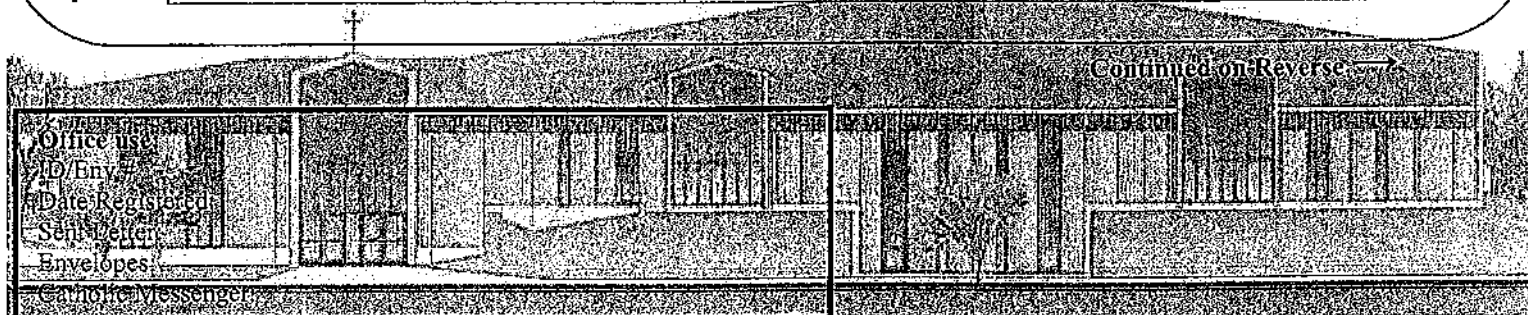

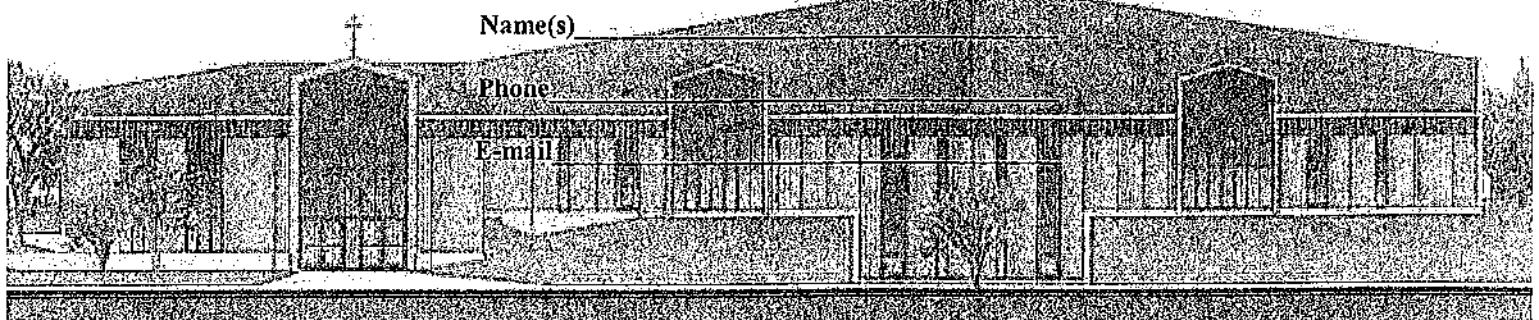
