Mission

Objectives

- To develop the technical skills necessary to play a musical instrument satisfactorily in an instrumental group based on the knowledge needed to attain success at the Elementary and Middle School levels.
- To cultivate and develop cultural and aesthetic values in order to possess an understanding of beauty, expression, and the ability to appreciate the finer things in life through actual participation in a performing organization.
- To develop leadership qualities, responsibility, and citizenship in students through their dedication to a cause and service to both school and community.

Band Student Expectations

1. Respect the podium, yourself, classmates, and your teachers.
 2. Sit with proper posture. Stay in your seat.
 3. Keep your hands to yourself. Don't play instruments that don't belong to you.
 4. Be Safe. Walk in the bandroom.
 5. Be Prepared. Practice at home, bring your instrument & music, always have a pencil.
 6. Be On Time. Be ready & in your seat 4 minutes after the bell rings.
1. Keep the bandroom clean.
 2. Water only in the bandroom. No gum or candy.

ATTITUDE: The greatest single factor determining the success of an individual or organization is attitude. Make the most of every rehearsal and performance.

DISCIPLINE: Because of the nature of the organization, discipline must be a necessity.

Students should always remember that they represent the band program, school, parents, and community when they are in the public eye. Any misconduct casts a direct reflection on our school and community.

Behavior Protocols

Classroom rules in the bandroom are consistent with the classroom rules in each grade level homeroom. Students are expected to maintain the same levels of safety, leadership, and respect in the bandroom as they do in their normal classrooms. I will utilize the behavior folder used by all 5th-8th grade classrooms. If a student's actions cause them to be in the folder for the same behavior on several occasions, I will first bring it to the attention of the student, and then I will contact home. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please feel free to contact me so we can discuss this.

Obtaining an instrument

To ensure a successful band experience for your child, a reliable instrument in good working condition is essential. The instrument should meet certain minimum standards for musical performance and mechanical reliability. All students need an instrument to play during band rehearsals, lessons, and home practice. Families must provide instruments for students. For your convenience, this is a list of reputable instrument makers: Artley, Armstrong, Bach, Buffet, Bundy, Cannonball, Conn, Gemeinhardt, Jupiter, King, LeBlanc, Ludwig, Pearl, Selmer, Yamaha. Below are four options for providing instruments:

1. Use a personally-owned instrument.
 - a. This can be with a purchase from an instrument store such as West Music in Davenport in Geneseo.
 - b. It can also be an instrument purchased from Facebook Marketplace or other reselling platform. Please be aware that there are many beginning band instruments of unacceptable quality in the marketplace today. These instruments do not meet our performance, mechanical, and maintenance reliability standards. If you are unsure about the quality or price of an instrument, please don't hesitate to contact me.
 - c. If you have an old instrument from a friend/relative, I highly recommend taking it to West Music or Larson Band Instrument Repair in Geneseo, IL to have it evaluated and cleaned. Older instruments wear down quickly if they have been unused for years. A cleaning and repair will get an older instrument back to playing condition for less than buying new.
2. Purchase an instrument from an online marketplace. Beware of band instruments of unacceptable quality in the marketplace today. Many of these instruments do not meet our performance, mechanical, and maintenance reliability standards. If you are unsure about the quality or price of an instrument, please don't hesitate to contact me.
 - a. If you choose to purchase your own instrument, please come to me or West Music or Larson Band Instrument Repair if you have questions. Walmart and Amazon sell instruments cheaply, but you get what you pay for- their quality is not very good.
3. Rent an instrument from a music store.
 - a. I suggest West Music. There are a few other rental stores, but West has the most affordable and easiest-to-repair instruments when damage occurs. West has a variety of new and used instruments for a monthly fee ranging from \$30-\$210 per month. Most rental plans include repairs.
4. Borrow an instrument from JFK.
 - a. JFK has a very limited selection of instruments to borrow. Because of our limited selection, beginners may not get their top choice of instrument.
 - b. Any damage resulting from misuse or carelessness on the part of the student will result in repair charges being the responsibility of the student and his/her parents or guardians. It is strongly suggested that parents secure insurance coverage with their homeowners' policy for these instruments. Normal wear and tear costs will be covered by the school.

Instrument Maintenance

Instruments, like cars, need regular maintenance. Keys and valves should be oiled regularly, along with tuning slides. Reeds also need special attention for proper care. To keep your instrument the best it can be, you will need to keep your instrument properly maintained. Please refer to the front of your method book for proper maintenance requirements. Please ask Mrs. Rohrer for help or if you have questions.

5th Grade Band:

- Traditions of Excellence Book 1 by Bruce Pearson & Ryan Nowlin
 - Each instrument has its own book. Select the correct book for the instrument your child plays. West Music and Amazon sell these books.
 - Provided band folder
 - Pencil

6th Grade Band:

- We will use Traditions of Excellence Book 1 then transition to Traditions of Excellence Book 2 by Bruce Pearson & Ryan Nowlin
 - Each instrument has its own book. Select the correct book for the instrument your child plays West Music and Amazon sell these books. **Your student may need to replace book 1 from 5th grade.**
 - Provided band folder
 - Pencil

7th-8th Grade Band:

- Habits of a Successful Middle School Musician (everyone except percussion)
 - Each instrument has its own book. Select the correct book for the instrument your child plays. West Music and Amazon sell these books.
 - Primary Handbook for Mallets by Garwood Whaley (percussion only).
- Students will be required to purchase specific method books for their instrument to be used during their individual and group lessons. These books will be used for solo and ensemble contests. Information will be provided at a later date.

How to Practice Effectively at Home

1. Find a quiet place, away from the TV, phones, etc. where interruptions will be kept to a minimum.
2. Have a straight back chair, music stand, and proper lighting in this practice area.
3. Work to schedule a daily practice routine of approximately 10-20 minutes.
4. Look up fingerings you do not know in your band book.
5. Circle your problem measures, name and finger the notes slowly over and over without playing (air playing). This process will help you establish the fingering patterns of a piece of music.
6. Using a metronome app, play the problem measure slowly, gradually increasing the tempo.
7. If counting problems persist, take time to figure the counting system and count/clap the rhythms. If you cannot count a rhythm, you cannot play it with accuracy.
8. Record your practice. The recording will tell you the truth about how you are doing. It will help you assess what you still need to improve.
9. Remember: How you practice is much more important than how much you practice. Practice makes progress. Try to improve, every day.

Grading

Students will be graded on three areas and will receive four grades per quarter on the following aspects: rehearsal and lesson participation and preparation, playing check-offs, and concert etiquette and participation.

Grading Rubric:

E Exceeding 90-100%

M Meeting 80-89%

D Developing 70-79%

B Beginning 60-69%

IE Insufficient Evidence 0-59%

Add/Drop Band Class Policy:

6-8th Grade Band class can be dropped from a student's schedule without penalty before the first mid-quarter of each semester. If the student drops band after the first mid-quarter, a zeros/IE/F grade will be added to any graded activities through the end of the nearest quarter, and the grade would be calculated as such. Band class can be dropped at the end of the quarter.

5th Grade Band class can be dropped at the end of the first quarter of the first semester without penalty.

5-8th grade students can join Band class at the beginning of semesters, fall and winter.

Honor Bands

5th-8th grade band students are encouraged to audition for honor bands. Auditioning for honor bands requires much more practice and dedication than typically required. Students must prepare required music, record an audition with Mrs. Rohrer, and work with her to submit audition materials. Honor bands are a great way to connect with like-minded kids from around the state, play interesting new music with cool directors, and have tons of fun. The process of auditioning, rehearsing, and performing in an honor band is very rewarding.

Individual and Group Lessons:

- 15 minute graded weekly lessons will be scheduled after the school year starts.
- Students need their instruments and music on their lesson days, which might be different days than their band rehearsal days.
- An email will be sent to families when lessons are scheduled for the school year.

Music Boosters

The Music Boosters Program is a group dedicated to continuing and improving the music department at JFK. The program consists of the music teachers and parents of **all** students at JFK. The Music Boosters provides ALL funding for band, choir, and general music. The program also helps with important discussion and decisions such as cost of student trips, student trips offered, fundraisers, honor bands, instrument purchases/repair, and many other behind-the-scenes tasks to keep the music program running smoothly.

All parents and guardians of band students are automatically part of the Music Boosters Program. We value your opinions and contributions as we try to make the music program beneficial to each and every student in the classroom.
